Comprehension Scaffolds for Guided Reading

Step 1-Turn Facts into Questions: Use green question cards to teach how to write a question that is "right there" Use chart below in reading notebook to write a fact and then turn it into a question After reading, students take turns asking their questions If no one can answer the question, the children are allowed to look back in text
